
## WHAT'S ON YOUR NIGHTSTAND **Book Discussion** November 2025

**The Black Wolf** by **Louise Penny** - The 20th in the Inspector Gamache series: Chief Inspector Gamache and his team uncover and stop a domestic terrorist attack in Montréal, arresting the person behind it. But their relief is short-lived...

The Frozen River by Ariel Lawhorn - A historical mystery inspired by the life and diary of an 18th-century midwife who defied the legal system.



**The Island of the Missing Trees** by **Elif Shafak** - The story of a forbidden love between a Greek Cypriot and a Turkish Cypriot in 1970s Cyprus, their journey to London, and their daughter Ada's search for identity and connection to her heritage.




Kinfolk by Sean Dietrich - It's the '70s in southern Alabama, and 62-year-old Jeremiah Lewis Taylor has spent his whole life listening to those he loves tell him he's no good, but he's never harmed anyone – except perhaps himself.


*The Locked Ward* by **Sarah Pekkanen** - Some doors should never be opened!

**Redhead by the Side of the Road** by **Anne Tyler** - A novel about misperception, second chances, and the sometimes elusive power of human connection.




Venetian Vespers by John Banville - A trip to Venice takes a dark turn for a British writer and his American wife. Dark, twisty, and consistently smart.






## **NONFICTION**



**This American Woman: One-in-a-Billion Memoir** by **Zarna Garg** - a hilarious memoir; the story of her wild ride from escaping an arranged marriage and homelessness in India to carving her own path in America

**Child of Earth and Starry Heaven** by **L. Annette Binder** - Binder spends hour upon hour in memory care with her mother and begins to see hints of a world almost invisible to outsiders, where residents might lose cognition but they remain capable of feeling and expressing love.







*Erosion: Essays of Undoing* by Terry Tempest Williams - An exploration of the many forms of erosion we face – both cultural and environmental.

Goliath's Curse: The History and Future of Societal Collapse by

Luke Kemp - A historical autopsy on our species, from the earliest cities to the
collapse of modern states; traces the emergence of "Goliaths" – large societies built
on a collection of hierarchies that are also terrifyingly fragile, collapsing time after
time across the world.





**Spillover: Animal Infections and The Next Human Pandemic** by **David Quammen** - An astonishing quest to learn *how*, *where from*, and *why* these diseases emerge, and he asks the terrifying question: What might the next big one be?
